




Church Family News...

A Note from Fr. Geoff

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

We have now entered the Nativity Fast - or Advent - once again. This wonderful time of year is a time of penitence and preparation as we look forward to the celebration of Christmas. The decorations are already up in stores and the Christmas music is already being played on the radio. It seems that the world wants to speed forward to Christmas without taking the time to really reflect on its meaning.

And this is a challenge for us. We, who know that the true meaning of Christmas is not found in consuming more and more; who know that the meaning is much deeper than trees and decorations. We have an opportunity to take this time to try to *slow down*. It is particularly hard, in our contemporary culture, to slow down, especially at this time of year. December is busy. There are parties to plan and attend. There are decorations to put up. There are meals to prepare.

But even as we do all this, we do well to spend extra time each day in reflection. Ruminate on the meaning of this time. Here are some Scriptures that can be starting points for our meditations on the Mystery of God's Incarnation over these next five weeks or so:

- Isaiah 2:1-5, where the Prophet foresees the incorporation of the Gentiles (that's most of us!) into God's plan and foresees a day when war shall be a thing of the past
- Isaiah 11:1-10, which prophesies the coming of the Messiah
- Isaiah 35:1-10, prophesying a time when the sick will be healed, the barren places will be fruitful, and those dispersed will be gathered in
- Isaiah 40:1-11, which foretells of a time when mankind's sin will be forgiven and the glory of the Lord will be revealed
- Malachi 3:1-5, which foretells the coming of St. John the Baptist, forerunner of our Lord
- 2 Samuel 7:8-17, which is God's promise to King David that his dynasty will reign forever
- Micah 5:1-5a, foretelling that the Messiah will be born in Bethlehem
- Luke 1:5-25; 57-79, which tells the story of the announcement and birth of St. John the Forerunner
- Luke 1:26-38 tells the story of the Annunciation to the Theotokos
- Luke 1:39-56 tells the story of the Visitation of the Theotokos and St. Elizabeth, and Mary's beautiful *Magnificat*, which echoes the Old Testament prophecies

It is my prayer that this time of preparation and reflection will be fruitful for each and all of you, and for our whole parish. Let us open our hearts to hear God's word afresh. Let us be open to listening for what the Lord is trying to teach us at this time. Let us ask for the grace of true repentance. And let us look forward with joyful hope not only to the coming of Christmas but to Christ's glorious Second Coming, when all the nations shall "beat their swords into plows and their spears into pruning hooks." (Isaiah 2.4)

Feast of the Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple

This upcoming Thursday, November 21st, is the Feast of the Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple. The background story to this event is pretty important.

The righteous Joachim and Anna were devout Jews who loved God very much. They lived on only a third of their income, tithing and giving away the rest. Yet they had no child. They promised God that they would give their child back to Him, if He would grant them one, and He blessed them with the gift of their daughter Mary.

When Mary was three years old, her aged parents, Joachim and Anna took her on a three day journey to present her in the Temple in Jerusalem to fulfill their promise to dedicate



her to the Lord's work. The Virgin was clad in royal garments and she was accompanied by a grand procession of her kinsmen each carrying a lighted candle. There were 15 steps leading up to the Temple. Her parents stood her on the first step, then Mary ran to the top. She was received by St. Zacharias, the father of St. John the Forerunner, as he was the High Priest at that time. He took her by the hand and led her into, not only the Holy Place, but into the Holy of Holies. This was the place that only the High Priest was to enter, only on the Day of Atonement. The only explanation is that he was moved by the Spirit of God. Joachim and Anna offered sacrifices to God, received the priest's blessing and returned home. Mary lived in the Temple for nine years. Her parents visited her often until they reposed. She wanted to remain in the Temple all of her days and never marry. The law had no provision for this. It was unheard of for a girl to vow perpetual virginity. So she was betrothed to Joseph. Joseph was an older man whose wife had died leaving him with small children to care for. He needed someone to help him care for the children and she needed someone to protect her in a society that had no place for a single woman. This allowed her to remain a virgin after she left the Temple at age twelve.

The Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple signifies her total dedication to God and her readiness for her future vocation as the Mother of the Incarnate Lord. This is a feast of anticipation. As honor is shown to Mary, the faithful are called to look forward to the Incarnation of Christ, celebrated in a little more than a month by the Feast of the Nativity on December 25th.

To celebrate this Feast Day, we will have a Vesperal Divine Liturgy on Wednesday evening, November 20th, at 6:00 P.M.

Twenty Third Sunday after Pentecost

But God said to him, "Fool! This night your soul is required of you; and the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' So is he who lays up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God."

The Rich Man in today's Gospel reading was defined by his riches. His preeminent thoughts were about collecting, protecting and hoarding his wealth. He forgot that he would have to let it all go one day. Our Lord tells us that "where your treasure is your heart will also be." The Rich Man was so distracted by his material wealth that he could not see that the real treasure was not his possessions. The real treasure lay within. The real treasure



within is eternal. Jesus called it "the Kingdom of heaven." That night the Rich Man had to face death and he was not ready for it...

Because we are out of touch with the kingdom of heaven we get lost in life. We lose sight of what matters. Today Our Lord asks us to detach from earthly things because this is how we come alive to what is real, to His presence, to the kingdom of heaven within us. And he does it with such words as these, "Do not resist the evil man, but if he strikes you on the left cheek turn and offer him your right." "If a man asks for your shirt, give him your coat as well." "If a man asks you to go one mile with him, go with him two." The Lord asks us to push the envelope and act in a way that is against our natural inclination to self-defense because this is how to deflate and eventually transform the ego that thinks only of itself. So when we are insulted Jesus exhorts us to bless! He commands us to love our enemies, and not in words only, but from the depth of our hearts. By doing the opposite of what seems natural to us, striking back, and taking revenge, cursing our enemies we allow what is negative and ungodly in us to die and what is positive and godly in us to rise.

Jesus said, "Blessed are the poor in spirit for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." How do we become "poor in spirit". By detaching ourselves from everything that we hold on to so dearly. To be "poor in spirit" is to be free of attachments, to be free from things, to nurture relationships that are free and unencumbered by desires and expectations, to let go of our own self-definitions and to rest in the knowledge and experience of God who is "in all places, filling all things." As we continue our journey of the Christmas Lent we are to remember to let go of earthly things, possessions and the cares of this life and to be grateful to God in every situation. In this way we cleanse the inside of the cup, as Jesus said, and begin to shine like the stars of heaven from within. Amen.

St. Philips Fast Nov.15 - Dec.24

"But you", He said, "Who do you say that I am?" Then Simon Peter spoke up, "You are the Christ," he said, "the Son of the living God." Matthew 16:15-16.


"Who do you say that I am?" Was there ever such a penetrating question? Our answer to this question reveals not only who we think Christ is, but also who we are. Many of those who first heard Jesus ask this question were men and women of the Law. This is why they thought Jesus only a prophet. But Simon Peter could truly see Jesus for Who He Is. In his answer Peter revealed himself to be a man of God. What of our answers to the question of Jesus? What do our answers say about us? Are we men filled with the Holy Spirit? One of the most ancient titles Christians give



themselves was "Christ-bearers." From the very first we have been aware that we are called "to bear the mysteries of God," to bear Christ to the world. As we prepare to greet Christ in His Nativity and His Baptism in the Jordan, we should look to our life. Do we bear Christ in all of our life, or only in those parts of our life we consider "religious" or "spiritual"? May our life during this season bear witness to the reality that "Christ is among us!" May our life answer that Jesus is "the Christ, the Son of the living God."

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St. Philips Fast Nov.15 - Dec.24

During this fast it was the custom to observe a strict abstinence on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and a lesser abstinence (mitigation from wine and oil) on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The Ruthenian Metropolia has identified this period as a penitential season. This fast may be observed voluntarily, partially or in its entirety.

Fasting appears gloomy until one steps into its arena. But begin and you will see what light it brings after darkness, what freedom from bonds, what release after a burdensome life...

To worthily meet our Lord and Savior, we should sanctify this pre-Nativity season of the Phillipian Fast. Sanctifying means spending our time in faith and in the service of God and in kindness towards our neighbor, especially those who are in need of our assistance. And we should think of what we would have been had Christ not come to our lowliness and poverty. Together with the whole of the Byzantine Church we should try to meet Christ as he deserves to be met and as it will, in His mercy, best serve our spiritual benefit!
